Plessy v. Ferguson (1896)

Jim Crow Laws: racial segregation laws to separate blacks and whites in public and private facilities Example: Louisiana law required separate railroad cars for blacks and whites

<u>Plessy</u> – black man who sat on whites only railroad car, he's arrested and appeals his case all the way to the Supreme Court

<u>Ferguson</u> – district court judge that originally ruled against Plessy

<u>14th Amendment</u>: made all persons born or naturalized in the U.S. a citizen + "Equal Protection Clause": guarantees equal protection under the law +"Due Process": Gov can take life, liberty, or property without due process

Case Question: does the Louisiana law violate equal protection under the 14th Amendment?

Q <u>Supreme Court Ruling</u>: "Separate but equal" laws DO NOT violate the 14th Amendment

Q <u>Result</u>: The *Plessy* decision legalized segregation for the next 60 years
